Knee or Hip Pain?

When getting in and out of a car, climbing stairs, playing golf, or just squatting down to pick up an item become painful, it may be time for a complete orthopedic evaluation. Chronic hip and knee pain can be signs of disease or the result of trauma, and often over time can become debilitating. At the Joint Replacement Center at Conway Medical Center, we have a comprehensive team in place to help our patients who need knee or hip replacements.

About Our Program

What sets our program apart is our experienced Joint Replacement team. Our team uses an interdisciplinary approach to patient care and follows a clinical pathway, which follows stringent standards for high levels of patient satisfaction and low rates of complications and readmissions. What Is Joint Replacement?

Joint replacement surgery is removing a damaged joint and putting in a new one. A joint is where two or more bones come together, like the knee, hip, and shoulder. The surgery is done by a doctor called an orthopaedic (pronounced or-tho-PEE-dik) surgeon. Sometimes, the surgeon will not remove the whole joint, but will only replace or fix the damaged parts.

The doctor may suggest a joint replacement to improve how you live. Replacing a joint can relieve pain and help you move and feel better. Hips and knees are replaced most often. Other joints that can be replaced include the shoulders, fingers, ankles, and elbows.

At Conway Medical Center, our knee replacement surgery options include: Total Knee Replacement; Partial Knee Replacement; or Total Knee Replacement Revision. Our hip replacement surgery options include: Total Hip Replacement; Hip Resurfacing or Total Hip Replacement Revision.

These surgery options will be thoroughly reviewed at our free informational seminar, in addition to risks associated with these types of surgeries, planning ahead for your surgery, recovery and rehabilitation.

Post Surgery

One of our most important goals for you after surgery is to regain muscle control. Studies have shown that the sooner a patient begins to use their new knee or hip, the better their overall recovery will be. Because you have experienced many months of pain and decreased mobility, your muscles may not be in the best condition. Your Joint Replacement team will teach you strengthening exercises to practice before your surgery. After your surgery, you will begin a comprehensive therapy program. This program will begin as early as the afternoon of your surgery. Initially, these exercises may cause some discomfort but this will ease with repetition. On your discharge day, you should be able to dress yourself, get in and out of bed, be comfortable with your adaptive equipment including your walker or crutches, manage your pain and do your home exercise therapy program efficiently. And the care provided by our Joint Replacement team does not end when our patients go home. We monitor our patients' recovery and offer ongoing educational seminars as well as a support group. This "connectedness" helps ensure excellent outcomes in the months following surgery.
